Truthfulness Scale</td> <td>5. Suicide Risk Scale</td> </tr> <tr> <td>2. Depression Scale</td> <td>6. Alcohol Scale</td> </tr> <tr> <td>3. Anxiety Scale</td> <td>7. Drug Scale</td> </tr> <tr> <td>4. Substance Use Disorder</td> <td>8. Stress Management Scale</td> </tr> </table> <p>Scores are used to classify risk into four categories:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Low Risk • Medium Risk • Problem Risk and • Severe Problem <p>These classifications, along with clinical judgment, are used to inform treatment recommendations.</p> <p>Truthfulness Scale detects offender denial, problem minimization, and response bias.</p>	1.
